A SUSTAINABILITY AUDIT PROPOSAL FOR MIDLANDS UNITARIAN ASSOCIATION CONGREGATIONS

UNITARIAN TRANSFORMERS MARCH 2024

Unitarian Transformers (UT) is a grassroots organisation that started almost three years ago, funded initially, by the Wood Green Trust. The focus of UT is building community, transforming lives through online presence, education, and collaboration under the leadership of Rev Mark Hutchinson. UT has worked to develop a weekly online ministry which is now part of what is becoming a more unified national presence online. Within an educational collaboration UT are providing children lessons and activities that will be available online. A substantial part of Unitarian Transformers' work has advanced several project opportunities with Unitarian congregations, developed through an initial sustainability audit.

MUA

The MUA has commissioned Unitarian Transformers to offer a sustainability audit to congregations within the MUA fellowship. The MUA objective has always involved offering training, support, advice, where appropriate – funding, and foster links with its fellow congregations. Conscious that the effects of the Covid pandemic have left our congregations in precarious ways, the MUA 2024 remit is to acquire a clearer picture of the needs and wants of the congregations in its area. In this way responding to the needs of those member congregations in a more strategic way. To achieve this objective, the MUA has contracted Unitarian Transformers to undertake a specific audit review.

Congregations are offered the chance to take up this opportunity, at no cost, up until July 2024.

The Audit:

The audit aims to assess the current position of each congregation around aspects of resources and programs. It aims to also review congregations' hopes for the future and aid them in drawing out areas of possibilities, mapping future needs.

The aim of the Sustainability Audit is to aid congregations in their decision-making process. It will also facilitate the work of the MUA to meet their objectives of offering support, advice, funding and training, where appropriate, for all the congregations of the MUA. This audit will enable each individual congregation to assess their needs going forward. But it will also allow for an accumulation of congregational information. This can then help the MUA meet their objectives of assessing the support and aid requirements. It can also help towards assessing any potential collaborative ministry that can assist the development of Unitarianism in the Midlands.

Reasons to work with the UT MUA project.

- 1 No charge to the congregation. The cost of each audit is around £1500+ (met by the MUA)
- 2 The UT team brings a background in looking to assist a range of different congregations.
- 3 UT successfully applied for the grant with the Wood Green Trust and can help both the MUA and individual congregations prepare the ground, look for financial support, especially the new GA fund that is likely to become available before the end of 2024.
- 4 Doing nothing is no longer a viable option if we wish to prevent further closures of our churches and Unitarianism in the Midlands is to survive into the future.
- 5 A great chance to share the burdens and opportunities all congregations have, and to develop a way of working together and minimize duplicated processes.

What does the Audit Involve?

The audit requires your time. The Unitarian Transformer team will visit you over a period of 5-9 days, ask questions, leave and do with you questionnaires, research your demographics, assess your resources regarding finances, people, skills, and time. Unitarian Transformers have done this before and have been able to suggest to congregations ways to maximise their resources and re-engage in their community. The audit looks at areas of worship, pastoral care, rites of passage, building accessibility, governance and policies, programs, administration needs, rental and events, finance, membership, social action, outreach and children. This list is not exhaustive.

What is not involved in this Audit?

- a study to assess whether your building is suitable.
- a study to see about extension building works.
- architectural services, property advice or surveys (drawing up plans for alterations/ extensions)
- aiding with building regulations consent
- project managing building works audit.
- asbestos audit
- access audit surveys (regarding disability accessibility)
- condition surveys (to inspect the building for deterioration- although this is recommended that you do every 5 years)
- structural survey

Quinquennial inspection reports

After this work:

The MUA will have information to develop strategic planning to aid congregations better.

Each congregation will have a document to assist decision making.

Each congregation may also contact the Unitarian Transformers for more specific studies that are outside of this audit's remit, at the cost and discretion of the congregation.
