The information I have had from the organisers is:

Abbey Foregate and Raven Meadows are open throughout the whole event.

Last year's timings were St Julian's opened at 11am and Frankwell was 11:15. (I have seen a sign that Frankwell is closed until 12).

We had the whole road network open at 11:15am.

Access into town via St Michaels Street and up Castle Foregate, down Dogpole and Wyle Cop is also open throughout. There are likely to be long delays here due to all the work being done by the train station. Abbey Foregate is probably your best option.

The Shropshire Humanists will meet in the church on Thursday 17th October.



***************** Shrewsbury Fairtrade

On Saturday, 5th October from 10.30 until 12 noon , we will be holding a Fairtrade Coffee Morning at Shrewsbury URC in the St Nicholas Hall.

We shall be take time at about 11.15, to tell you how trading in the Indoor market, and other stalls, has fared over the last 12 months.

We also want to tell you about a new scheme, whereby we will be linked with a producer group in India through "Transform Trade" (formerly Traidcraft Exchange).

There will be the usual Fairtrade stall, with Christmas cards to order, and a range of goodies which might be just what you need as Christmas presents!

And of course, there will be tea, coffee and home made Fairtrade cakes to enjoy.

REAL FAIR TRADE – An Introduction.

Nearly 50 years ago a group of mainly Christian people from the North East of England set up Traidcraft – the world's first specifically fairly trading organisation. A not for profit company Traidcraft pioneered guaranteed price agreements direct with with food and craft producers in developing countries. Traidcraft imported, processed and sold - mainly via Churches, charities like Oxfam and independent Fair Traders. Realising the limitations of this business model and wanting to get larger retailers and food processors more involved, Traidcraft was a major player in setting up the Fairtrade Foundation, whose approach is more that of a regulatory body – setting standards and licensing wares produced and marketed by others. The success of Fairtrade (FT) was too some extent a problem for Traidcraft whose limited volumes struggled to price compete with similar FT products sold now by all the main supermarkets. The trading arm of Traidcraft went into administration in 2023, although a recent revival has re-launched some products, including the famous tea, back on to the market. The Traidcraft associated organisation, the NGO Transform Trade, continues to exist as an important and influential lobbying and research organisation.

Fairtrade Foundation is a massively important and successful organisation with more than 2 million independent farmers, grouped into near 2,000 locally based trading organisations holding licences that guarantee them the stability of minimum prices levels and are monitored to ensure they meet certain set standards on environment, equality and employment issues. Moreover the producer communities benefit for a community premium generated as a small percentage of the retail sales. This premium is administrated by FT Foundation but its application is decided by the communities themselves on the basis of need. In many such communities the premium is a major funder of their education, health and infrastructure needs. Every time you buy FT tea, coffee or bananas you are helping build clinics and schools, train nurses and teachers, improve roads or internet access in communities that would not otherwise have these things. Last year FT trade sales in the UK raised £28million for the Community Premium. The FT monitors FT licenced producers to ensure its standards are met. It can do this independently, because, unlike the large producer global corporations, it has no direct interest in the production level. The monitoring is funded from the significant income FT gets from the UK based processors and retailers who pay it a license fee to display the FT logo. That logo - AND ONLY THAT LOGO – guarantees that product you are buying is comprised of at least 85% materials produced by licenced and monitored FT producers.

Alarmed by the growth of FT and unwilling or unable to met its standards and democratic methods of production, some large corporations looked around for alternatives. No doubt those responsible for originating some organisations like The Rainforest Alliance had very good intentions, but their certification standards are nothing to do with Fair Trading and their logo's main purpose, in my opinion, is to confuse the consumer in to thinking they are with the good people. They are not. Don't buy this stuff, it's the moral equivalent to sleeping with the enemy. There are 6,000 licenced FT products on sale in the UK, not just tea and coffee but wine, gold and craft items. Buy them and feel good about yourselves!
